

nated \$130,000 to many nonprofit organizations through cash and in-kind contributions. B.I.D.A. continues to contribute financially to help the community thrive.



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Workforce scholarship is offered

BERWICK — In 2019, the Berwick Industrial Development Association (B.I.D.A.) launched a Workforce Scholarship Program for high school graduates from the Berwick Area School District (which included students attending Columbia-Montour Vocational-Technical School) who were to attend post-secondary or higher education institutions to pursue their education in the vocational trades.

Although the program has been successful with scholarships being awarded to two students each year, B.I.D.A. re-examined the present state of the workforce with having a shortage of skilled labor in the region, and the board of directors voted to offer the scholarship to unemployed and underemployed individuals in the Berwick Area School District geographic area.

This shift would allow residents to apply for \$1,000 that could essentially pay for an entire program at the Columbia-Montour Vocational-Technical School's adult education. There is an application process, and it will still run annually as it does for the high school applicant. In the spring, residents can request a scholarship application that also provides instructions on what needs to be included.

- The purpose: To place focus on the importance of skilled trades and workforce development in the region, and highlight the need for skilled workers for local businesses.
- The amount: B.I.D.A. will offer two scholarships, each for \$1,000.
- The use: B.I.D.A. will send the scholarship funds directly to the educational/ training institution you are enrolled in, to offset the cost of tuition.
- Eligibility: Berwick Area School District Resident who has been accepted and has paid their enrollment deposit to an approved PDE (Pa. Department of Education) vocational training/workforce skills

Applicants cannot be immediate relatives of a sitting B.I.D.A. board member or staff.


